CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

We celebrated our landmark 150th anniversary with superb events throughout England and Wales. They were a fitting tribute to our founder John Joseph Mechi and all those who followed in his footsteps, ensuring that the Charity continues to provide much needed support within the farming community, as we and our successors will hopefully do for the next century and beyond.

The celebrations could not have been more successful in terms of raising the Charity's profile which will doubtless pay dividends in the future. This was due to the sterling work of our county committees, other volunteers, the fundraising, marketing and communications team at Shaw House, our regional officers and numerous supporters. The latter included many corporate organisations that provided invaluable sponsorship along with helping to spread the word about the work we undertake.

Events ranged from unique cathedral services, including our first national event held at Westminster Abbey, to sporting challenges, dinners, dances, cream teas and the fun Welly Week to name but a few. We are particularly grateful to the National Federation of Young Farmers for not only choosing RABI as their charity for the year but also to the members who turned out to help at our functions.

All in all an unforgettable year of celebrations and a sound footing from which to look forward to the next 150 years!

At our AGM in May we said farewell to Lord Plumb as our longstanding and hardworking president for the past 22 years. We can't thank him, together with Lady Plumb, enough for all the time they have

committed to the work of RABI and their tireless support which has come in so many different ways. We were therefore delighted that Lord Plumb accepted the invitation to become a vice-president of the Charity thereby ensuring we will maintain our close links.

Later in the year, at a lunch kindly hosted by Lord Plumb at the House of Lords, we formally welcomed His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester as our new president. We are honoured that he agreed to take on this role amongst his many other commitments. We look forward to his support and encouragement, which are already evident, over the next few years.

We also said farewell to Andrew Densham as our chairman for the past three years. His sterling work ensured the Charity continued to thrive and he led a number of initiatives including a review of our all-important residential homes and the preparation of the new Royal Charter.

As the year drew to a close thoughts turned to the future. Plans were put in place for the trustees and senior staff to meet early in the New Year to start the process of preparing a strategy for the next 10 years. No organisation, however strong, can stand still. We need to build upon our strengths and ensure the Charity is proactive, as well as reacting to requests for support and exploring ways of working with other charities. MONTH BY MONTH – HIGHLIGHTS OF AN ANNIVERSARY YEAR

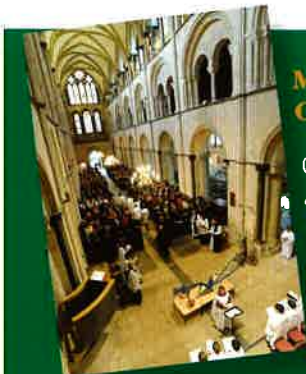
Our 150th anniversary year, with over 150 RABI events across England and Wales, will be remembered for many years to come.

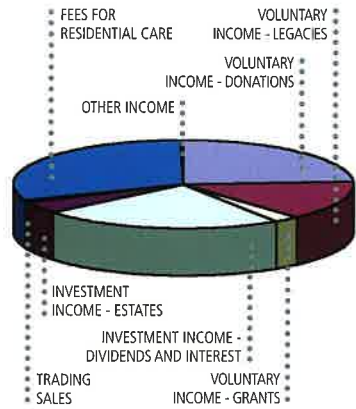

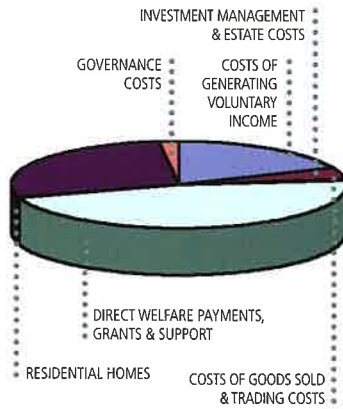

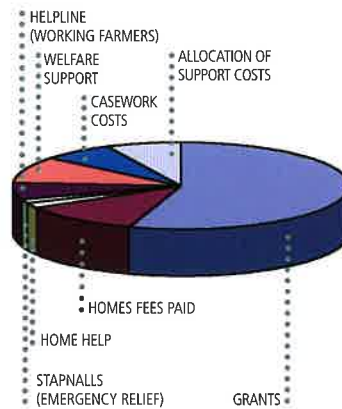
TOTAL EXPENDITURE

In April RABI was the chosen charity for Ludlow Racecourse's annual charity race day, an event that raised over £40,000. Also, as the YFC chairwoman's charity of the year, RABI had a high profile at the NFYFC annual convention.

May saw the 150th annual general meeting held in the resplendent surroundings of Blenheim Palace and RABI featured on the John Joseph Mechi garden at the Royal Chelsea Flower Show, in conjunction



with Tiptree, which was celebrating its 125th anniversary, and Writtle College.

RABI golf days have become popular fundraising events in a number of counties, with the national RABI golf challenge held in Oswestry in June.

Throughout the summer RABI was represented at all the major and numerous local summer shows with several show societies

helping to raise our profile and funds by selecting RABI as their charity of the year.

In July, RABI had 150 places in the annual British 10k London run and, supported by Yara UK and the Farmers Club, our red shirted runners from across England and Wales brought a splash of colour to the streets of the capital, raising over £33,000.

RABI's first national cream tea event, supported by jam makers Tiptree and Cornish clotted cream producers Rodda's, took place during the August bank holiday week. The event attracted tea parties in gardens from Cornwall to County Durham, in barns and on farms as far apart as Sussex and Northumberland and in offices, including AGCO's headquarters and RABI's solicitors Blake Laphorn.

Starting in September, RABI's anniversary was celebrated in many harvest thanksgiving services across the country, including in 14 cathedrals, from Truro to Canterbury and Brecon to Ripon (the venue for RABI's national Harvest Festival) where we were supported by farmers' unions and young farmers.

October in the RABI calendar means Welly Week. There was the usual range of welly orientated activities involving all ages from school children,

college students and young farmers to RABI county committees and Farm Women's Club members.

A reception at the House of Lords in November was a fitting venue for the transfer of the RABI presidency from Lord Plumb to HRH The Duke of Gloucester. It also provided an opportunity to thank many of the organisations and companies that had supported RABI throughout the year.



PROVIDING HELP IN 2010

The welfare department received over 600 enquiries and referrals during the year, as a result of which 340 members of working farming families were helped through a variety of crises, with a total of £195,171 being paid out in emergency grants.

In 2010 we were supporting 1,365 long-term beneficiaries aged between 24 and 101 with 85% of them between 60 and 90 years old. They included one person who RABI has supported for nearly 34 years and two who became beneficiaries during the year at the age of 100.

A total of 333 people were helped by the purchase of items such as white goods, beds and mobility scooters, or by disability adaptations and improvements to their homes, accounting for an expenditure of £290,250.

During the year the 12 regional welfare officers made 1,780 visits to beneficiaries, including those they were able to assist by ensuring that they were receiving the correct amount of welfare benefits and tax credits. In 2010 they helped claimants recover a total of £341,350 to which they were unaware that they were entitled.



The carol service in the impressive setting of Dorchester Abbey, Oxfordshire provided a fitting finale to the national celebrations in December, involving trustees, volunteers, beneficiaries and members of staff, with the county's young farmers stewarding the post-service refreshments.

CASE STUDY

Every year the welfare department receives scores of thank-you letters from people whom we have been able to help. They express the gratitude that is felt for the support received but they can only hint at the often traumatic or tragic circumstances that have made it necessary.

This is the story behind one of them:

Ifor and Anna Edwards farm 280 acres in Wales on the borders of Shropshire, milking 120 cows and keeping 300 ewes. Running the farm on their own provides enough challenges but they are also coping with a 13-year old daughter who has suffered from devastating problems since birth.

Elisha, who is the middle of their three daughters, was unable to speak until she was six and her mental capacity has remained that of an 18-month-old child. As well as deformity of her spine and feet, making standing hard and walking any distance or climbing stairs impossible, over the years Elisha has suffered many problems, including kidney failure.

Enforced inactivity coupled with a compulsive eating disorder have resulted in considerable weight gain making it impossible for her mother to carry her upstairs anymore. With only a small farmhouse it was not possible for Elisha to sleep downstairs, especially as her limited awareness of danger means that she has to be supervised at all times.

The Edwards were able to get a grant from Wrexham County Borough Council towards a ground floor extension with disabled facilities and bedrooms but they still had to find 30 percent of the costs, which would not have been possible without £5,000 from RABI.

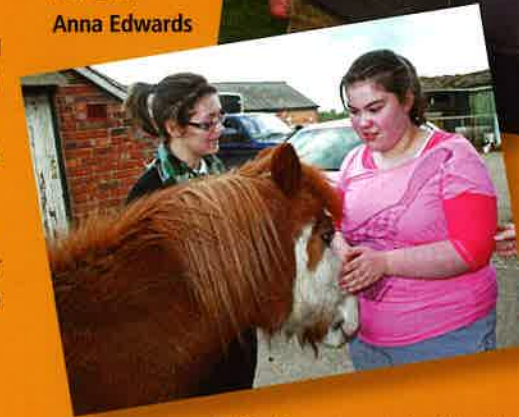

not only restored it to its former glory but also devoted considerable time to taking the tractor round numerous shows to sell tickets. The raffle raised over £43,000 for RABI.

Throughout the year Young Farmers' Club members provided invaluable support at many of the RABI events, including assisting with bucket collections at shows where RABI was the chosen charity of the year. Many YFCs organised fundraising activities raising in excess of £25,000.
